

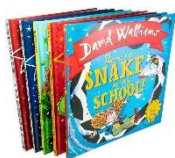

How to Make a Mono-Print



1. Roll out the ink in an even layer.



2. Quickly draw a design into the ink.



3. Firmly press some paper on top.



4. Peel off the paper to reveal your print.

Elements of Art

An artwork is made up of different elements, often used together to make a final piece of art.

Line



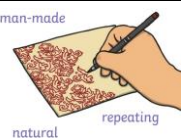
A mark that is longer than it is wide. It is a moving mark.

Colour



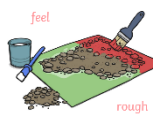
There are 3 primary colours: red, yellow and blue. Mixing 2 primary colours together creates a secondary colour: orange, purple or green.

Pattern



A pattern uses a repeated design or a motif, created using line, shape, or tone. They can be natural or man-made.

Texture



The way a surface feels.

Shape



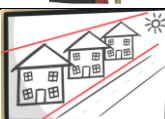
A shape is flat and created by a closed line.

Form



Form is a three dimensional (3D) shape.

Space



Space is the area around or between objects.

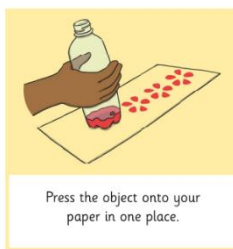

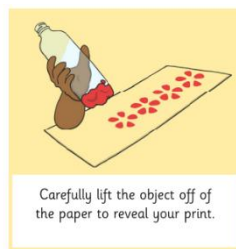

Use a paintbrush to apply paint to the bottom, or dip it into paint.

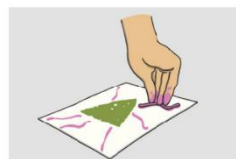
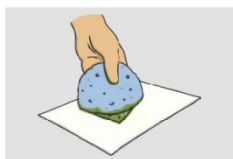


Press the object onto your paper in one place.



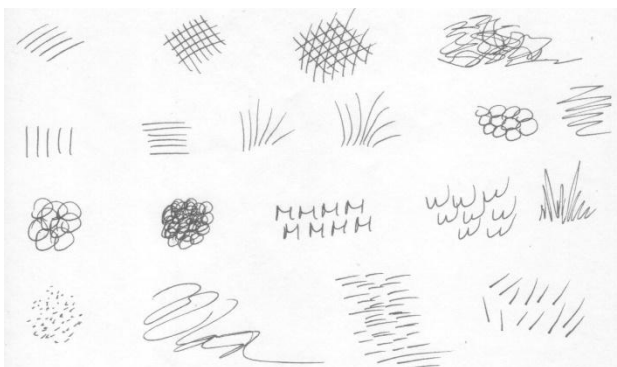
Carefully lift the object off of the paper to reveal your print.
